HOW'S MOM?

Learning about high blood pressure during pregnancy and after birth could help save a life.



What is gestational hypertension?

High blood pressure that occurs during pregnancy and up until one year after birth. It usually happens after 20 weeks of pregnancy, even if they didn't have high blood pressure before.

What is hypertension?

Blood pressure is the name given to the force that blood causes against the wall of the vessels (arteries) that carry it. If this pressure gets too high, it's called hypertension.

Who should pay close attention?

- If giving birth for the first time
- Person with diabetes
- Over 35 years old
- Pregnant with more than one baby
- Family history of gestational hypertension
- Experiencing high stress

• Normal: 120 over 80

• Elevated: 120-129 over 80

• Stage 1: 130-139 over 80-89


Stage 2 : 140 (or higher) over90 (or higher)

• Hypertensive Crisis: 180 (or

higher) over 120 (or higher)



Call your doctor and talk about ways to lower your blood pressure



Don't wait to call 911 if you have blood pressure of 180/120. This is a medical emergency.

Why is it a problem?

- The leading cause of pregnancyrelated deaths in Florida are hypertensive disorders (2020).
- Preeclampsia is affecting 9.4% of South Florida's maternity patients, more than double the national average of 4.2% over the past 30 years (Memorial Healthcare System, 2023).

What is preeclampsia and eclampsia?

Preeclampsia is a sudden spike in blood pressure during pregnancy or after birth (from 2 days up to 6 weeks).

Eclampsia is more severe and can include seizures or coma, and death.

These conditions increase the risk for having high blood pressure, kidney disease, heart disease, and stroke later in life.



Don't wait to call 911 if you have blood pressure of 180/120. This is a medical emergency.
